CHARACTERS.

Suspects: Characters believed to have possibly committed the crime A regular in the din
Detective: Character trying to solve the mystery Bunny Brown and Jack Tong
□ Witnesses: Characters who saw the crime being committed
SETTING:
This is the location where the mystery takes place.  The Grill Next Door
PLOT:
When reading a mystery, the story usually includes one of the following:
A problem that needs to be solved The monkey is missing.
An event that cannot be explained Why did the monkey disappear
The secret
Something that is lost or missing between 8 an and 9:00 am
A crime that has been committed The monkey by the cash register is gon
<u>LUES:</u>
Clues are hints that can help the reader and the detective solve the mystery. They can be
things people say or do, or objects that are found that provide important information.
(Check the box if the mystery you read had clues.) The differences between
the "Regulars" were clues.
ED HERRINGS:
These are distractions or false clues that may lead the reader or the detective off track. Red
herrings often make it more difficult to solve a mystery. (Check the box if the mystery you read
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ECIPE FOR A MYSTERY: the lunch box
ast mysteries are set up the same way. The structure of a mystery usually looks like this:
Beginning: Characters are introduced and the reader learns about the problem
Middle: Detectives work to solve the mystery by interviewing suspects and gathering clues
End. The must are in solved
